20 MILLION PINK SALMON



“it’s like being in an aquarium full of salmon!”

The Pink Salmon are the smallest of the Pacific Salmon species, averaging 4-6lbs, with bigger fish up to 10lbs available. They return to our local rivers every 2 years on the odd year only. Their runs are huge, providing anglers with a very consistent and fun-filled sport fishery. This year’s run is estimated at around 20 million fish!

We consider this a **world-class fishery**. It is truly an amazing sight when you can see thousands of these salmon swimming all around you. Imagine the thrill of watching these fish chase your fly and other offerings all day long... it’s like being in an aquarium full of salmon! During peak times, hooking 30-50 salmon/person in an 8hr outing is not uncommon! The only way to explain this kind of fishing is that “It’s an angler’s dream come true!”. During the peak of the run, the Fraser River becomes “ALIVE” with these fish. Day after day, everywhere you look, pink salmon are rising as they move up the river.



Don't miss the 2011 Pink Salmon run. Prime dates are booking fast... book your trip now!

They are very aggressive and are probably the easiest to catch out of the 5 salmon species. You can watch multiple fish chase your presentation at any given time! They provide **phenomenal fly fishing** opportunities to beginner and expert fly anglers alike. If you're just learning how to fly fish, this is the fishery for you... there are so many fish around that **you will catch fish!** Traditional spinning and casting gear is also extremely effective using a variety of baits, and these fish are a lot of fun on light tackle. The Pinks are in our rivers from late August to early October, with fresh and silver fish available in Aug. and Sept.

The Pink Salmon fishery is truly a great fishing experience for anyone who enjoys fishing. It's **perfect for kids** who are just learning how to fish and makes for **fun family outings**. It's also great for **corporate or group events**, especially if you want to impress someone with a fun-filled and exciting day of fishing!

2010: Year in Review

The past season seen it's share of ups and downs, but overall, we seen a lot more positives than negatives on the river, and we had another fantastic season with many great fishing opportunities for our guests. Here are some of the highlights from our 2010 season:

Our 2010 **Sockeye** salmon returns were at a historical high and made international headlines. With an estimated run size of almost 40 million fish, no one had seen such numbers of sockeye in over a century. This was very encouraging to see, especially after the extremely poor returns of 2009. While the Fishery guys were scratching their heads looking for an explanation to this phenomenon, all sectors of the fishing community (commercial, native, and recreational) were enjoying amazing harvest opportunities. We, the recreational sector, enjoyed a retention opening that lasted almost 2 months, which is unheard of. Lots of fish for all!

To the surprise of many, we also had an excellent return of **Coho** this past fall. Not only did we see big returns of wild and hatchery fish, they were big too. This was excellent to see, as our recent Coho returns have been below average. Guests who targeted Coho saw some great results, both for numbers and size.

Both summer and fall **Chinook** runs were very strong as well, and many anglers that put their time in targeting these awesome fish were rewarded with some nice catches, both on fly and gear.

Despite the fact that preliminary run size estimates were lower than forecasted, the **Chum** run was quite strong and we had many amazing days fishing for this large and aggressive species. Float fishing with jigs definitely produced the best results, but our fly-fishing guests had many great days with amazing bright fish full of sea-lice. In October, the Fishery Department unexpectedly closed the retention on chum salmon. This worked to our benefit as it really reduced angling pressure from local anglers and the native community did not have a commercial beach seine fishery either, so more fish for our catch & release guests :o).

Sturgeon fishing was once again very good and extremely consistent all year. We spent a bit more time in the **Fraser Canyon** this past season. More and more of our guests are requesting the Canyon Sturgeon trips... the exciting jet boat ride, the incredible scenery and amazing fishing make this a truly special sturgeon fishing experience.

In July, we also used the Fraser Canyon as our base camp for **shooting a TV fishing show for a new series**. Unfortunately the show hasn't aired yet and due to contractual obligations, we are not permitted to release the name of the show until then.



We spent a week wilderness-camping with the host and film crew in search of giant sturgeon. Although we didn't find any 10ft monsters, the fishing Gods were with us and we were rewarded with some amazing fish for the cameras.

We also spent a lot of time sturgeon fishing in the tidal portion of the river and had some absolutely incredible results, right into mid December. Our guests enjoyed many 20+ fish days, and some even had a few 30+ days. If you've never fished in this area, we strongly recommend you try it during your next visit, especially in the spring or fall.

We didn't land any 10ft monsters in 2010, but certainly had a few very large fish on that could have exceeded that size. We had lots of average fish in the 4-7ft range, and a good number in the 8-9ft as well. The Harrison River produced some really nice fish in late October.

Due to several last minute Team cancellations, we had no choice but to cancel the **2010 World Sturgeon Classic** tournament. There weren't enough participants to make the tournament possible. At the present moment, we are unsure if we will continue with the tournament in the future, but should have a decision shortly.

For a second year in a row, the Fraser water levels were very low during late summer and early fall, meaning that water clarity was very good. With these water conditions, our guides spent more time concentrating on the Fraser main stem itself and produced excellent results using all methods... fly, spin, float, and bar fishing. For those that bar-fished for salmon, they were rewarded with some amazing days of 20-30 hookups... mixture of Chinooks, Cohos, and Chums... wow!

There is another reason why we spent more time on the Fraser main stem this fall season. The Harrison River's water clarity was very poor due to an enormous landslide that came down, way up in its watershed... **(See picture and text)**. Although draining through 2 very large lakes, the silt



never did settle, and gave the Harrison that glacial green/ cloudy color all fall. The salmon were there, but the water conditions weren't favorable for fly-fishing. As many of you know, the Harrison typically offers world-class fly fishing opportunities, so let's keep the fingers crossed that things will improve by the fall 2011 season... and they should.

To all of you that were able to join us this past year, THANK YOU so much for visiting. We truly appreciate and value your business. And to those that wanted to be here but couldn't make it, hopefully we'll be able to provide you with a first class sport fishing holiday in the upcoming season. We are currently taking a lot of reservations for 2011 and

if you are interested in booking your trip, we would be more than happy to assist you.

Thanks again to all of our guests for providing our team with so many great memories this past season and we look forward to seeing you again shortly.

2010 YEAR IN REVIEW

*B.C. got hit by the second-largest landslide in Canadian history on Aug. 6. A two-kilometer wide landslide sent 40-million cubic meters of earth plunging down the flank of Mount Meager into the Lillooet River Valley, near Pemberton. The slide partially blocked the river, and thousands of residents were put on evacuation alert. **This was the cause for the poor water clarity on the Harrison River this fall.***

For the past 10 years, the word has been spreading across the world's sportfishing community. Stories of massive fish exploding on the water's surface and epic battles that measure in hours, not minutes. Stories of fish so powerful, anglers have to continuously rotate on the rod and even stories of fish so large that they couldn't be moved off the bottom. In most cases, you would think, sure, another exaggerated fishermen's tale, but on the Fraser River, this is absolute reality. There are monsters in this river.

So what is it about these fish that has gotten anglers excited? Why do so many travel thousands of miles to fish the Fraser River? Is it their immense size and unbelievable power? Is it their amazing acrobatics and incredible abundance?

The answer is very simple. Many of our guests will tell you this: There aren't many places in the world where one can hook so many large fish consistently, even if deep sea fishing. Most abundant are fish in the 3-6ft range (20-180lbs), however, reality is, there are more fish over 7ft (200lbs+) in this river than one can imagine, so anglers always have a very realistic chance of hooking that trophy fish of a lifetime. It's just a matter of being in the right place at the right time.

You might not hook a 6 or 7ft on your first day of fishing, or you might hook a couple 8fters. If you're lucky like our guests from the UK were last year, your first fish of the holiday could be a 10ft , 600lb monster! You might have a slow day and only land a couple fish, or you can have a stellar day and land over 20 fish! But the truth is, this is our most consistent fishery and rarely do we not hook any fish. From one angler to another, I have to say, this is an unbelievable fishery.

Booking one day might not give you a true representation of what this fishery has to offer, but if you spend a few days fishing with our professional sturgeon guides, you'll be almost guaranteed to hook a fish over 6ft! Many of our guests that come on a sturgeon fishing holiday go home with multiple catches of fish over 6ft. For many first time sturgeon hunters, it seems like the 6ft mark is the magic number to achieve. But they quickly learn that fish of that size are all too common and that's where it all starts... the pursuit of beating that personal best. Knowing that there are fish in this river that can exceed 13ft and weigh more than 1500lbs, it is no wonder that our guests come back year after year in search of that next trophy giant.

Many of our guests come to experience the phenomenal salmon fishing opportunities, only to go back home talking

about the giant fish they caught... yes, even the fly fishing purists. And it's not because of a lack of salmon they landed, but more so because they fought and landed a fish that was bigger and stronger than they were. This is as close as you'll get to saltwater fishing for Tarpon, Sailfish, and Marlin, and the best thing is, you'll hook way more sturgeon than you ever will on a Marlin trip. FRASER CANYON STURGEON



Approx. 45 minutes east of Chilliwack is a beautiful stretch of river that offers a truly remarkable fishing experience. It is the beginning portion of what we call the Fraser Canyon. Here, the river gets narrower, a lot deeper, and also, a lot faster. Most of it is simply unfishable, but the areas that are, can provide some amazing fishing opportunities.

Fraser Canyon sturgeon are lot different than the lower river stocks, both in looks and their feeding habits. A lot of these fish are still considered to be transients, and do move up and down the river regularly. We have proven this with the ongoing tagging program. However, there are also a lot of resident fish that live in these waters for good portions of their lives.



Their scutes are usually dull, worn right down by the “sandpaper effect” from the silt that’s carried in the heavy current. But the most distinguishable feature on the canyon fish is the really long and streamline nose, which allows them to root in between the gravel and boulders when searching for food.

These fish live in an extreme environment where water level fluctuations between winter time lows and summer time highs can reach over 40ft. Heavy currents and very seasonal food supplies, tend to make them more opportunistic feeders. Bites are typically very committing and if there are many fish around, it can create a feeding frenzy down there. It’s not uncommon to arrive in a spot and have 3 rods go off

immediately. With food being scarce, it's survival of the fittest. First to the food gets to grow bigger... it's as simple as that.

This kind of feeding is very typical in the Canyon, so rarely do you have to wait long to get bites. Since these fish are very opportunistic, they're usually not too picky with baits either. All this equates to a very consistent fishery, right from March, all the way through to mid October.

The Fraser Canyon is also known for its giants, who feel right at home in these treacherous waters. Every now and then, we hook river monsters that cannot be moved off the bottom. Some of these epic battles have lasted more than 3 hours, only to be lost. We know there are 12'+fish living up there, because we've seen them rise out of the water on more than several occasions.

The Fraser Canyon portion of the river offers one of the best chances of hooking a trophy fish of a lifetime. Combined with an incredible jet boat ride through some of the most scenic terrain in Southwestern BC, this makes for a truly remarkable sturgeon fishing adventure.

If you have yet to experience the Fraser Canyon fishery, we highly recommend you add it to your next sturgeon fishing holiday. We guarantee that you won't go home disappointed.

August and September should be absolutely phenomenal, and the great fishing should continue right until the end of December. We expect some really big fish to be landed this year!

PINK SALMON

Description: This strange run has our pink salmon return every 2 years on the odd year only. Smallest of the pacific species, what they lack in size, they sure make up in numbers. Our last several runs have been absolutely enormous, providing our guests with constant and exciting action all day long. It's not uncommon to hook 20-50+fish/person on any given day, and some of our guests have hooked close to 75 fish/person/day during the peak of the run!! Whether you enjoy spinning or fly fishing, this is a fishery that can be enjoyed by novice and expert anglers alike.

Timing: late August - mid October

Forecast: We've had to wait 2 years, but the news is fantastic! The pinks are expected to arrive in full force in 2011... an estimated run of nearly 20 million strong!! From late August to early October, we expect this fishery to provide at least a solid month of fantastic fishing opportunities. This is a very popular fishery and boats are booking fast. Don't wait, book now!

CHINOOK SALMON (KING/SPRING)

Description: The Chinook is the king of them all, and they don't call them kings for nothing. They're big, they're strong, and they'll bust your tackle if you're under-equipped. They never fail to provide the angler with an exhilarating and challenging battle... big runs, high leaps and heart-stopping pulling power. These fish are one of the most sought after species by many serious anglers worldwide. Most fish average 15-30lbs., but certain strains can reach weights up to 80lbs!

Timing:

Summer-run Chinook: June - September

Fall-run Chinook: October - November

For the more adventurous angler, we now offer a "remote river" adventure on the pristine Lillooet (March/April) River system that offers early season fly fishing opportunities for these trophy specimens. This is a unique fishing experience that should not be missed out on. Contact us for more details.

Forecast: We are expecting another solid year for our summer Chinook salmon returns. July and August should provide some really good fishing for these fish. It will be difficult to target Chinooks on the Fraser in September due to the overabundance of pinks, but once that run is done, we should once again start seeing great results in October, especially when bar-fishing.

CHUM SALMON

Description: They're the second biggest of the Pacific Salmon, averaging 15lbs, with plenty of 20-30lb. fish around. Their colorful markings, large size, hard fighting abilities, and sheer numbers makes them a choice favorite for many anglers. They enter our rivers by the millions, and provide the angler with excellent sport fishing opportunities as they aggressively attack bait, artificial lures and flies... 20-40 fish days are not uncommon!

Timing: mid September - mid December

Forecast: The chum runs never seem to disappoint our guests. It's one of our most consistent salmon fisheries. Fish should start showing up as early as mid September and will continue to push in until late November. If you want consistent hookups with large and powerful salmon, this fishery is for you! Our guests experienced unbelievable chum fishing last fall and we're expecting similar results for 2011.

SOCKEYE SALMON

Description: It's hard fighting abilities and great tasting meat, makes this species a most sought after sport fish for many local and foreign anglers. The sockeye are known for their fast line-peeling runs and displays of aerial acrobatics. This popular summer time fishery provides exciting fishing opportunities for everyone. Lots of people but millions of sockeye. For most, this is a harvest fishery.

Timing: mid July – mid September

Forecast: After watching the runs go from record lows in 2009, to record highs in 2010, it's really hard to predict what we'll see in 2011. This is the 3rd year of the 4-year cycle, which typically produces lower returns. Having said this, preliminary DFO estimates are looking better than expected. We will notify everyone should there be a sockeye retention opening this year.

COHO SALMON

Description: One of the most prized and sought after game fish in the Pacific Northwest. Known for their fighting prowess, these salmon can be taken on spinners, jigs, spoons, flies, and bait. When coho are "in the mood", they will attack a fly with reckless abandon. They hit like freight trains and then roll, jump and flip flop trying everything to shake your hook.

Timing: October - mid December

Forecast: There should be a lot of fish pushing through our area from Sept –November. Both the Fraser main stem and its local tributaries should offer very good opportunities for big, bright silver Coho during this time period. Fish will be present in the rivers right into December.

STEELHEAD

Description: There is something to be said about the steelhead when anglers travel thousands of miles in hope of catching a few of these hard-fighting and acrobatic beauties. They aren't nearly as abundant as our salmon and at times they can seem to be elusive and "moody", testing the angler's abilities, knowledge, and experience to its fullest. It seems that this sort of challenge grows on certain anglers, and the steelhead has a large world-wide following of die-hard "steelheaders", who travel all over in hopes of landing that trophy steelhead of a lifetime. For many river anglers, finding, hooking and landing a big steelhead is the ultimate experience in river fishing! Fly fishers can find this fishery very challenging but most rewarding on days with multiple hook ups. In May the Vedder River system turns to fly fishing only and lends itself to some fabulous opportunities for hook ups. Steelhead can weigh up to 22 pounds (11 kg.) or more with the average fish being 8-14 pounds.

Timing: January - April

Forecast: We've had an incredible start to this year's winter steelhead run. There were a lot of fish that showed up in early December and they are trickling in on a daily basis. This is a good indicator for a solid steelhead season. As long as we don't get too many days with low and gin clear water, we expect good results. We still have 3 more months of excellent fishing to come!

RAINBOW TROUT (Lake Fishing)

Description: Our expansion into the interior lakes has proved to be a great success.

Some of our prime waters fished with our professional instructional guides helped to produce Rainbow Trout up to 16 pounds (8 kg.). These trips are for fly fishers of any level and are very rewarding with days of multiple hook ups. Timing: Summer: May - July
Fall: September – mid November

Forecast: Rainbow trout fishing in the interior lakes is a very consistent fishery. Whether you prefer to still-fish a chromomid under a strike indicator or cast your line and strip a micro-leech, we're confident you'll enjoy the thrill of fighting these feisty and acrobatic rainbows.

CUTTHROAT TROUT, DOLLY VARDEN, BULL TROUT AND RAINBOWS

Forecast: Some of the best fly-fishing of the year is just around the corner. Giant sea-run bull trout will start entering one of our rivers in late May. This fishery will peak in June and July. These are incredibly aggressive trout that eagerly chase 5-7inch flies. This system also offers good fly-fishing opportunities for both cutthroat and rainbow trout, along with dolly varden as well.

Once we move late into the fall and throughout winter, the Lillooet River system becomes a hot destination for fat and aggressive wild rainbow trout. Here you will also find eager dolly varden and cutthroat trout that are ready to snap at single eggs, nymphs and streamers.

If you're an avid and passionate trout fly angler, these 2 river systems offer some very unique fly-fishing experiences.
